Welcome

St Peter's became a faith academy in August 2011. We work closely with a family of Catholic primary schools in Stroud, Cheltenham and Gloucester, as part of Little Way Catholic Educational Trust.

The primary schools consist of: St Peter's Catholic Primary School, St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, St Catharines Catholic Primary School, Catholic School of St Gregory The Great, St Thomas More Catholic Primary School and The Rosary Catholic Primary School.

We also work with other secondary schools and within the wider community.





Curriculum

The teaching of key subject knowledge is rigorous and often inspiring. Students' learning skills are well developed. Senior members of staff visit every 11 - 16 lesson every period of the day to ensure that students are working well.

We offer a coherently planned, ambitious and well sequenced curriculum.

We know that high quality teaching is vital to ensure student progress and “**The St. Peter's Six**” is founded in cognitive science. Careful lesson planning, varied teaching methods, motivating guidance and sensitive but honest assessment will enable all students to achieve their academic potential.

Our curriculum is carefully designed to be ambitious, inclusive and aligned with the needs of all learners.



At key stage three all students follow a core curriculum including Art, Computer Science, Drama, English, Modern Foreign Languages, Geography, History, Maths, Music, PE, Religious Education, Science and Technology.

In Key Stage Three students are mostly taught in mixed ability groups (with some setting in Maths) enabling young people to progress academically and socially.

At key stage four students are prepared for GCSE and vocational examinations. They continue to follow a core curriculum of RE, English, Science and Maths but are also able to make some option choices. They have a wide range of options. Most students can expect to study at least eight GCSEs.

The *English Baccalaureate* is a performance measure introduced by the government in 2010. It recognises the success of pupils who attain good GCSE passes across a core of academic subjects English, Maths, History or Geography, the Sciences, Computing and a language.

It is designed to encourage more students to receive this broad education in core academic subjects which ensures they have plenty of options at key stage Five and in the future.

The English Baccalaureate may not be appropriate for all students, however, and we will offer appropriate guidance to year 9 students about key stage four option choices.

At key stage Five we offer a wide range of A-level and level 3 vocational courses. St Peter's students are guaranteed a place in the sixth form as long as they meet the individual course requirements.

We teach RHSE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education) in line with statutory requirements but with guidance from the Catholic Education Service. Mental health and wellbeing of students is a very important component of this curriculum. We also have a well resourced Student Support Services centre to aid this work.



Special Educational Needs

St Peter's identifies and provides for students with special educational needs, learning difficulties and those with other physical, emotional, behavioural and social learning needs across all abilities and ages so that each student is able to develop and achieve.

Subject teachers identify pupils with learning difficulties or special educational needs by using departmental criteria and/or data from, for example, primary schools. They will use a range of strategies to address the student's needs but may also involve the school's Partnership and Learning Team.

All pupils identified as experiencing learning difficulties will be monitored by the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator and the Partnership and Learning team.

All members of the community will be made welcome at St Peter's. The school will do all within its power to provide the best education for each student offered a place here.





Safeguarding & Child Protection

All staff (including volunteers) have to undertake safeguarding training every three years in accordance with the Gloucestershire Safeguarding Children's Executive stipulation. Designated child protection staff receive training every 2 years. All staff have a responsibility for the safeguarding, welfare and protection of all students in the school. The safeguarding policy, the child protection policy and St Peter's 'offer of early help' can be found on the school website.

Working together

We work with parents and guardians to achieve the same goal; the success of every student. We welcome the involvement of parents and guardians in school life and want to know about anything which can help us to help your children. Your support is vital.



It is important that the school and parents work together to ensure students progress.

Every student has a personal tutor who gives special care, guidance and support to the students in his or her tutor group. One period a fortnight focuses on Personal Development. Any concerns which parents or guardians have should be raised with the tutor or the head of year.

Students who are experiencing severe emotional difficulties or personal problems and who need additional assistance can seek confidential and sensitive support from the chaplain and the Student Support Services and may wish to receive counselling.

We are responsible for identifying students who are clearly very able or have a particular talent. They are challenged in lessons with demanding material and concepts or by working on the same material in a different way. We want to motivate our more able students rather than allowing them to 'coast.'



Students who are able and those with a particular interest are also given opportunities to develop their skills in a wide range of extracurricular activities including art, creative writing, drama, mathematics, music, sport, or languages.

Staff complement classroom teaching with other experiences, including the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme, visits to the science festival and to Cern, trips to art galleries, museums and theatres; sporting activities including skiing and rugby; trips abroad to places such as Paris, Canada, Madrid, New York and Iceland and to outward bound centres at home and abroad. Experts are often invited into school to work with students.

Events have included creative writing workshops with visiting authors; science talks from visiting experts; students collaborating with visual artists and participating in drama workshops.

Facilities

We enjoy excellent specialist facilities including a sports pavilion, a new 3G pitch and astroturf; a drama theatre and drama studio; music and ICT rooms - all well equipped with computers and specialist software; a large library, managed by a chartered librarian.

We are committed to a constant programme of refurbishment to ensure the school meets the needs of its students both now and in the future.

ROCK Award

St Peter was the Rock of the Church and our school is founded on the core ROCK values of Respect, Optimism, Community and Kindness. Students strive to gain points in each of these areas which lead to badges and bronze, silver and gold ties.



Assessment and Feedback

Each subject sets homework in accordance to its own homework policy. We use an app called 'Edulink' which allows parents, as well as pupils, to see which homework has been set and when it is due. Students and parents receive log in details to allow them to access the relevant homework.

Also, at two specific points in the year, assessment letters will be sent home which show the levels that have been awarded for assessments and pupils' attitude to learning in every subject.

Parents and carers can follow their children's progress in detail by signing up to the school's 'insight' programme. Parents' evenings are held once every academic year and are an important opportunity to discuss the progress of every student. Parents and guardians are also asked to look regularly at the work of the students especially their homework.



Thinking ahead

At key stage four, students are guided by subject teachers and tutors to make sensible option choices to complement the core, compulsory subjects.

Education is now compulsory until students are 18 years old.



St Peter's Sixth Form offers a range of level 3 courses, both academic and vocational.

The newly refurbished sixth form provides a wide range of academic and vocational courses which allow each student to develop personal talents and aspire to fulfilling courses and employment in the future. Full, independent advice and guidance are provided for all year 11 students, so that those who have needs and wishes beyond what we can offer at St Peter's can be guided properly and sensitively.

There is a prospective sixth-form evening each winter where students can see the options available. We try to be flexible and meet the needs first and foremost of our own students when planning our courses.

After their final exams, most students progress to higher education or to degree apprenticeship. They receive individual guidance about applications for colleges and university.

Gaining a place

We currently prioritise places to all Catholic pupils in Cheltenham, Gloucester, Stroud and the Forest of Dean who want a Catholic secondary education, providing this is evidenced by a certificate of baptism in a Catholic Church or a certificate of reception into the full communion of the Catholic Church.

We welcome applicants from other faiths but demand for places is great. Therefore the governors have a set of criteria for non-Catholic applicants. Please review the admissions policy on our website to find out more.

Visiting the school

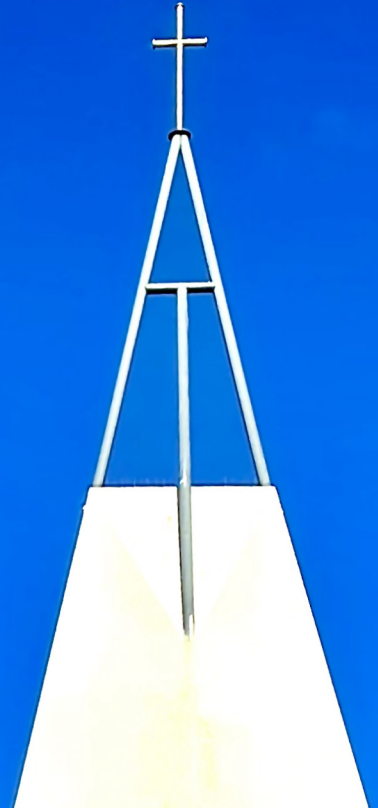
We welcome prospective students, parents and guardians to Open Week which is held in late September.

Years 7 – 11 ADMISSION POLICY 2027-28

St Peter's Catholic High School & Sixth Form Centre was founded by the Catholic church to provide education for children of Catholic families. Catholic schools are inclusive, and we welcome applications from children who are not Catholic. However, where there are more applications than places available, allocations will be made in accordance with the oversubscription criteria listed below.

We aim to provide a Catholic education for all our pupils and that Catholic teaching and practice permeate every aspect of school life. We therefore hope that all parents will fully support the aims and Catholic ethos of the school.

The academy trust is the admissions authority and has responsibility for admissions to this school. The term "governing body" is used throughout this policy to refer to the admission authority under the appropriate constitutional arrangements. The local authority undertakes the co-ordination of admission arrangements during the normal admission round (see note 6). The governing body has set its admission number at **240** for pupils to be admitted to Year 7 in the school year which begins in September 2027.

The governing body will, where logistically possible, admit twins and all siblings from multiple births where one of the children is the last child ranked within the school's Published Admissions Number.

Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (see note 1)

The admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan that names the school must be admitted. Where this takes place before the allocation of places under these arrangements, this will reduce the number of places available to other children.

Oversubscription Criteria

At any time where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority.

1. Catholic looked after and previously looked after children. (see notes 2 & 3)
2. Catholic children who are resident in the school's designated parish(es) (see notes 3 & 12)
3. Other Catholic children. (see note 3)

4. Other looked after and previously looked after children. (see note 2)
5. Children who are a Catechumen (see note 5)
6. Children with a parent who has been a member of St Peter's Catholic High School & Sixth Form Centre staff for two or more years at the time of application, or who was recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skills shortage. This does not include staff who work on the school site for other employers.
7. Children with a proven aptitude in drama, music or sport (up to a maximum of 24 places) (see note 13).
8. Children of other Christian denominations whose membership is evidenced by a minister of religion. (see note 7)
9. Children of other faiths whose membership is evidenced by a religious leader. (see note 8)
10. Any other children.

Within each of the categories listed above, priority will be determined in the following order:

i) children attending a named Catholic partner primary school at the time of application (see Note 4). The partner schools are:

St Peter's Catholic Primary School, Gloucester

St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Nympsfield

St Mary's Catholic Primary School, Churchdown

St Thomas More Catholic Primary School, Cheltenham

St Gregory the Great Catholic Primary School, Cheltenham

The Rosary Catholic Primary School, Stroud.

ii) children who will have a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment. The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment will increase the priority of an application within each category so that the application will be placed above those without a brother or sister attending the school, within the category in which the application is made after children in (i) above. (see note 9).

Tie Break

Where children have identical ranking, priority will be determined by random allocation (see below). In category 7, applicants will be prioritised by their aptitude testing scores taking each discipline in rotation. The highest priority will be given to the highest scorer in drama, next priority to the highest scorer in music and third to the highest scorer in sport. This order of rotation will then be continued taking the next highest scorers until all have been placed in rank order.

Random Allocation

Each child will be allocated a number. These numbers are shared with a person independent of the school who will supervise the process. Governors will then use a random number generator to rank the numbers.

For children of a multiple birth, the order created by the random number generator, will be overridden to place all the children from the multiple birth together at the place where the highest child (from the multiple birth) is ranked. The random number generator will then be used to rank the children from the multiple birth. This

process will also be applied to brothers or sisters who are not from a multiple birth but are applying for a place in the same year group.

Application Procedures and Timetable

To apply for a place at this school in the normal admission round (see note 6), you must complete a Common Application Form available from the local authority in which you live.

or on a paper form available from and sent to; School Admissions, Gloucestershire County Council, Shire Hall, Gloucester GL1 2TP.

All applications which are submitted on time will be considered at the same time and after the closing date for admissions which is 31 October 2026.

You should also complete the Supplementary Information Form (SIF) attached to this policy if you wish to apply under oversubscription criteria 1 to 3 or 5 to 9. The SIF should be returned to the school office (see above postal and email addresses) **by 31 October 2026** to be considered in the first round of allocations or **by 6 September 2026** if applying under category 7. **If you do not provide the information required in the SIF and return it by 31 October 2026 (or by 6 September 2026 for category 7), together with any supporting documentation, your child may not be placed in criteria 1 to 3 or 5 to 9, and this is likely to affect your child's chance of being offered a place.**

You will be advised of the outcome of your application on 1 March 2027 or the next working day, by the local authority on our behalf. If you are unsuccessful (unless your child gained a place at a school you ranked higher) you will be informed of the reasons, related to the oversubscription criteria listed above, and you have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Late Applications

Late applications will be administered in accordance with your home Local Authority Secondary Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme (available from your Local Authority). You are encouraged to ensure that your application is submitted on time.

Admission of Children outside their Normal Age Group

A request may be made for a child to be admitted outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. Any such request should be made in writing to the school office (see above email and postal addresses) at the same time as the admission application is made on the Local Authority Common Application Form (for the child's chronological year group). The governing body will make its decision about the request based on the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child. In addition to considering the views of the head teacher, including the head teacher's statutory responsibility for the internal organisation, management and control of the school, the governing body will consider the views of the parents and of appropriate medical and education professionals, as appropriate.

If the governing body agree in principle for a child to be admitted outside of their normal age group, it does not guarantee the child a place. The parent will again need to make an application on a Local Authority Common Application Form (for the outside age group) and, if necessary, the oversubscription criteria will be applied to determine if a place may be offered.

Waiting Lists

In addition to their right of appeal, unsuccessful parents will be offered the opportunity for their child's name to be placed on a waiting list. This waiting list will be maintained in order of the oversubscription criteria set out above and **not** in the order in which applications are received or added to the list. Waiting lists for admission will operate throughout the school year. The waiting list will be held open until the last school day of the summer term. Each child added to the list will require the list to be ranked again in line with the above published

Inclusion in the school's waiting list does not mean that a place will eventually become available.

ADMISSION TO THE SIXTH FORM

- To be eligible for the Sixth Form, students should be under the age of 17 at the commencement of a 2-yr course or under 18 for a 1-yr course.
- The PAN for Year 12 is 100 (this figure is only applicable to students joining Year 12 from other schools).
- Students already on roll at St Peter's will be permitted to join Yr12, without the need to apply, provided they meet the entry requirements for the agreed programmes of study (a list of detailed requirements is available from the Sixth Form Office).
- Offers of a place by the Governing Body to external students wishing to join the Sixth Form from other schools will be conditional upon them meeting the entry requirements for the agreed programmes of study (a list of detailed requirements is available from the Sixth Form Office).
- Information about, and application forms for, the Sixth Form can be obtained from the postal address above or from 6thform@sphs.uk.com. Dates of open days will be published on the School website (<http://www.stpetershighschool.org.uk/>).
- External students who apply may be invited to a meeting with the Director of Sixth Form or a member of the Leadership Team of the Sixth Form to discuss course options and academic entry requirements. They will be invited to accept the standards and expectations of the Sixth Form, the ethos and character of the School and the educational offer being made through completion of the form attached to the offer of a place.
- External students wishing to join the Sixth Form in September 2027 should apply by **6 March 2027**. If oversubscribed, places will be offered in accordance with the criteria below:
 - A. Roman Catholic looked after children and previously looked after children^{Note2}
 - B. Other Roman Catholic^{Note2} students.
Note: To be considered under either of the criteria above, written confirmation that the child is Roman Catholic must be provided to the school ^{Note2}.
 - C. Looked after children and previously looked after children^{Note3}.
 - D. Students from other schools.
 - E. Other Students.
- Applicants within the same oversubscription criteria will be prioritised by a tie-breaker^{Note8}.
- Applications from external students after 6 March 2027 will be considered if places remain available.

NOTES

1. **Appeals Timescales.** As defined in the School Admission Appeals Code, appeals will be heard within the following timescales:
 - a. for applications made in the normal admissions round, appeals must be heard within 40 school days of the deadline for lodging appeals;
 - b. for late applications, appeals should be heard within 40 school days from the deadline for lodging appeals where possible, or within 30 school days of the appeal being lodged;
 - c. for applications to sixth forms:
 - i. where the offer of a place would have been conditional upon exam results, appeals must be heard within 30 school days of confirmation of those results;
 - ii. where the offer of a place would not have been conditional upon exam results, appeals must be heard within 40 school days of the deadline for lodging appeals;

- d. for applications for in-year admissions, appeals must be heard within 30 school days of the appeal being lodged.

2. **Roman Catholic.** In this policy, 'Roman Catholic' refers to any pupil who has been baptised, or received, into the Roman Catholic Church or into a faith in full communion with the Roman Catholic Church (a list of these faiths, as supplied by the Catholic Education Service, is available from School Reception). Written confirmation (eg a baptismal certificate) of membership of one of these faiths will be required. Where a certificate is not available, a statement from a member of the clergy, confirming that the person has (or in their opinion has) been baptised or received into the Catholic Church must be provided. The governors may also request sight of the original certificate.

In-Year Applications

An application can be made for a place for a child at any time outside the normal admission round and the child will be admitted where there is an available place. Application should be made in writing to the school office (see above email and postal addresses) using the school's In-Year application form – see In-Year form below.

Any supporting documentary evidence, for example, a baptism certificate or proof of a house move, should be provided with your application.

Where there are places available but more applications than places, the published oversubscription criteria, as set out above, will be applied.

If your application is refused, you will be offered the opportunity for your child to be added to the waiting list (see above).

The governing body will consider your application and you will be advised of the outcome of your application in writing, and if refused a place, you will have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Parents should be aware, that where an offer of a place is not taken up, it may be withdrawn.

Fair Access Protocol

The school is committed to taking its fair share of children who are vulnerable and/or hard to place, as set out in locally agreed protocols. Accordingly, outside the normal admission round the governing body is empowered to give absolute priority to a child where admission is requested under any locally agreed protocol (including over those on a waiting list). The governing body has this power, even when admitting the child would mean exceeding the published admission number.

Withdrawal

The governing body reserves the right to withdraw the offer of a place or, where a child is already attending the school, the place itself, where it is satisfied that the offer or place was obtained by deception.

Notes (these notes form part of the oversubscription criteria)

1. An Education, Health and Care Plan is a plan made by the local authority under section 37 of the Children and Families Act 2014, specifying the special educational provision required for a child.
2. A 'looked after child' has the same meaning as in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989 and means any child who is (a) in the care of a local authority or (b) being provided with accommodation by them in the exercise of their social services functions (e.g. children with foster parents) at the time of making application to the school.

A 'previously looked after child' is a child who was looked after, but ceased to be so because he or she was adopted, or became subject to a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order. Included in this definition are those children who appear (to the governing body) to have been in state care outside

of England and who ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

3. 'Catholic' means a member of a Church in full communion with the See of Rome. This includes the Eastern Catholic Churches. For someone to be treated as Catholic, written evidence of Catholic baptism or reception into the Church will be required. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of baptism in a Catholic Church or a certificate of reception into the full communion of the Catholic Church.

Whilst a copy of the certificate may be accepted, the governors may request sight of the original. The governing body may request additional supporting evidence if the written documents that are provided do not confirm the fact that the person was baptised/received into a Catholic Church. There may occasionally be difficulty in obtaining written evidence of baptism or reception into the Church. In such cases, contact may be made with a Parish Priest for advice on how the question of baptism/reception is to be resolved and how written evidence is to be produced in accordance with the law of the Church. The Priest may seek advice from Clifton Diocese. For the purposes of this policy, 'Catholic' includes a looked after child living with a family where at least one of the parents is confirmed as being Catholic.

4. For the purposes of this admission policy, attendance at a Catholic partner primary school includes those who were prevented from attending a partner school due to oversubscription and whose application to attend was unsuccessful, normally evidenced by a letter of rejection from the partner primary school or Local Authority.
5. 'Catechumen' means a member of the catechumenate of a Catholic Church. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of reception into the order of catechumens.
6. Within this policy, the 'normal admission round' means all new intake applications, submitted by the closing date and late applications received by the local authority up to 31 August, and so does not include In-Year applications (see above).
7. "children of other Christian denominations" means children who belong to other churches and ecclesial communities which, acknowledge God's revelation in Christ, confess the Lord Jesus Christ as God and Saviour according to the Scriptures, and, in obedience to God's will and in the power of the Holy Spirit commit themselves: to seek a deepening of their communion with Christ and with one another in the Church, which is his body; and to fulfil their mission to proclaim the Gospel by common witness and service in the world to the glory of the one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. 8. For category 7, drama, music and sporting aptitude will be assessed by tests to be taken by applicants during September/October 2026 and this criterion is only available for September entry into Year 7. The tests have been devised to be taken by children whether or not they have had experience or formal training in drama, music or sport and will determine the child's aptitude.
